I agree with the Principles of 30 minute auto-logout and automatic cold-boot at the end of the session, with these comments:

- 1. Most importantly, think toward an informal, cooperative environment.
- 2. We do need a background monitoring process that gives timely reminders of what the machine is doing. Something like:

BACKGROUND MONITOR: No meaningful work for 15 minutes.

Information only, not policing. A Wizard can write this process.

- 3. During work hours it should never be necessary to logout someone. The procedure should be to ask around to find out what's happening.
- 4. To aid finding out if a machine is forgotten:

The BACKGROUND MONITOR has posted a timely message, and there is not a COMMENT written in the Listener.

The idea is, if you want the machine to stay idle for more than, say, 15 minutes, then you have to write a note.

- 5. Cold-boots can be at the discretion of the next user. Whenever I want a machine and they're all busy, I end up talking to some human. We come to an agreement verbally.
- 6. Often, I walk away from a machine without cleaning the environment, because I hope to use it again in the near future, and I'm willing to take the risk that no one will come and take it. A COMMENT should be sufficient to cover my bet.
- So, again, the Meta-principle:

Make rules that depend on human communication and judgment. Don't make communication and judgment depend on rules.
